Heartland 101: Turnarounds scheduled for Heartland facilities *April 2015*

Just like the regular maintenance you perform on your vehicle and house, industrial facilities also require dedicated maintenance. Many companies in Alberta's Industrial Heartland take advantage of warmer weather in spring and summer to schedule a turnaround, in which production is suspended or decreased to perform maintenance activities.

Regular maintenance ensures the facilities are safe and efficient. This involves equipment inspections and, if necessary, repairs, replacements, and technology upgrades. The duration and magnitude of a turnaround varies with the size of each facility and extent of maintenance required. Some last only a few days while others may last a month or longer.

While turnarounds may create additional traffic on local highways due to an increased workforce, they also generate several benefits. Additional spending occurs on goods and services, providing a boost to the local economy. As well, the increased efficiency and environmental performance of facilities is of benefit to both companies and nearby communities.

Planning for a turnaround ensures the appropriate personnel, equipment, and processes are in place. It also involves community awareness, including utilizing the UPDATEline to keep the community informed about turnaround activities.
